Guidance

Children and young people across the country have experienced unprecedented disruption to their education as a result of coronavirus (COVID-19). Those from the most vulnerable and disadvantaged backgrounds will be among those hardest hit. The aggregate impact of lost time in education will be substantial, and the scale of our response must match the scale of the challenge.

Schools' allocations will be calculated on a per pupil basis, providing each mainstream school with a total of £80 for each pupil in years reception through to 11.

As the catch-up premium has been designed to mitigate the effects of the unique disruption caused by coronavirus (COVID-19), the grant will only be available for the 2020 to 2021 academic year. It will not be added to schools' baselines in calculating future years' funding allocations.

Identified impact of lockdown

Missed/disrupted curriculum coverage

During the academic year 2019/20 pupils missed 16 weeks of education. They were absent from school from March until the end of the academic year. During this time we provided pupils with paper based learning resources which were posted home as it was not possible for us to deliver online lessons. Some of our year 10 pupils attended towards the end of the academic year for a very limited time.

During the current academic year many of our pupils had to self-isolate either due to testing positive for covid or because they had come into close contact with someone who had. The table below shows the number of pupils in each year group who were required to self-isolate although some pupils had to do so on more than one occasion.

In addition our pupils will have missed 8 weeks of face to face learning due to lockdown 3. We have delivered online lessons via Microsoft Teams during this period but have faced significant challenges in setting this up. By far the biggest challenge has been that many of our pupils lack an electronic device and/or the internet at home meaning that they could not access the online provision. We had to stagger the introduction of online lessons as older year groups were prioritised in the laptop rollout. This has meant that years 7 and 8 in particular have had limited live teacher input. We have now provided the following number laptops to each year group:

Despite providing 421 laptops for our pupils attendance at online lessons has been well down on our normal school attendance. This has been due to a number of reasons including poor home Wi-Fi, especially when parents and siblings are using it, a lack of a suitable working space and some students choosing not to attend.

There are now significant gaps in knowledge across the curriculum in all year groups and subjects —units of work have not been taught meaning that pupils are less able to access pre-requisite knowledge when learning something new and they are less likely to make connections between concepts and themes throughout the curriculum. Pupils have also missed out on the curriculum experiences e.g. trips, visitors and powerful curriculum enrichment.
